


Graduation Block

14" finished (14.5" unfinished)



Color A

(4) 4.5" squares

(9) 2.5" squares

Color B

(12) 4.5" by 2.5" rectangles

If you are making a quilt I recommend using each fabric in (2) blocks.

1. Cut (1) 4.5" by WOF of each fabric.

Cross cut into (4) 4.5" squares and (9) 4.5" by 2.5" rectangles

OR

If using Fat Quarters cut (2) 4.5" by 22" rectangles

Cross cut into (4) 4.5" squares and (12) 4.5" by 2.5" rectangles.

2. Cut (1) 2.5" by WOF of each fabric.


Cross cut into (3) 2.5" by 4.5" rectangles and (9) 2.5" squares.

OR


If using Fat Quarters cut (1) 2.5" by 22" strip

Cross cut into (9) 2.5" squares

Constructing your Block:


Make (3)

Press to the rectangles.




Make (2)

Press to the rectangles



Sew rows together as shown, nesting the seams.



Here is a drawing of the quilt I will be making.

The pattern for the quilt and the finished quilt will be ready later this spring.

90" square.

24 blocks.

16 partial blocks.
