

# **Charmed Dutch Nine Patch Quilt with 13.5” Blocks**

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**Full/Queen – 95” by 95”**

**Twin – 68” by 95”**

**Baby or Lap Quilt – 41” by 41”**

**Block Size – 13.5”**

**This is an excellent quilt for Charm Packs, Fat Quarters and Fat Eighths. I just finished a totally scrappy twin top using Charm Packs and love it. I supplemented with some additional fabric from my stash.**

**Fabric Options:**

## **1. Scrappy**

Totally Scrappy – great for use with Charm Packs.

Good with Fat Quarters, Fat Eighths, and other larger scraps.

## **2. Scrappy with** every block in a different fabric.

## **3. Non-Scrappy – use coordinating fabrics**

**You can use solids**

**or prints .. anything that is recognizable in a 5” square or smaller.**

One light fabric

One medium fabric

One dark fabric

**Fabric Requirements:**

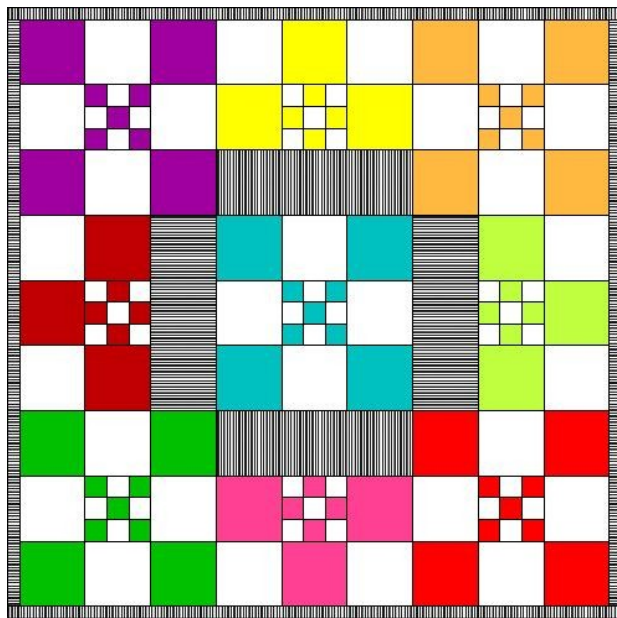
**1. Totally Scrappy** (I supplemented my Charm Packs with 5” squares cut from fabrics in my stash.)

	<b>Baby/Lap</b>	<b>Twin</b>	<b>Full/Queen</b>
5” squares or charms	44	159	225
Striped fabric for binding and inside border	1 yd	2 yds	2 ¼ yds
Background Fabric	1yd	2 ½ yards	3 ¼ yards



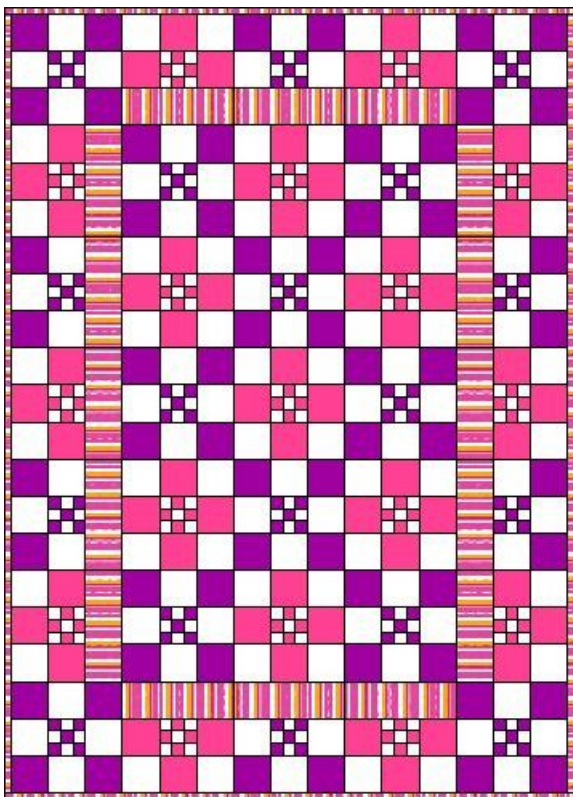
**2. Scrappy** with each block in a different fabric.

Number of different fabrics	9	35	49
5" colored squares for each block	Block A – 4 squares Block D – 3 squares	Block A – 4 squares Block B – 4 squares Block C – 2 squares Block D – 3 squares	Block A – 4 squares Block B – 4 squares Block C – 2 squares Block D – 3 squares

Striped fabric for binding and inside border	1 yd	2 yds	2 ¼ yds
Background Fabric	1yd	2 ½ yards	3 ¼ yards



### 3. Non-Scrappy

	Baby/Lap	Twin	Full/Queen
Dark Fabric	½ yard	1 ¼ yards	1 ¾ yards
Medium Fabric	½ yard	1 ¼ yards	1 ¾ yards
Striped fabric for binding and inside border	1 yd	2 yds	2 ¼ yds
Background Fabric	1yd	2 ½ yards	3 ¼ yards



## Cutting Directions:

WOF is Width of Fabric .. usually 42/44”.

### Inside Border (striped) Fabric

	Baby/Lap	Twin	Full/Queen
5” by WOF strips	2	6	7
<i>from these strips cut</i>			
5” by 14” rectangles	4		
5” by 41” rectangles		2	
5” by 68” rectangles (these need to be pieced)		2	4

### Background Fabric

	Baby/Lap	Twin	Full/Queen
5” by WOF strips	4	15	21
<i>Then cut into 5” squares</i>	32	118	168
2” by WOF strips	2	8	11
<i>Then cut into 2” squares</i>	40	157	220

### Colored Fabrics

- Totally Scrappy – GREAT use for 5” charm packs. You can also cut (4) 2” squares from each charm instead of cutting strips first.**

	Baby/Lap	Twin	Full/Queen
5” squares (charms) colored fabric	32	118	168
2” squares colored fabric (cut 4 from each charm)	41	158	221

**2. Scrappy** with each block in a different colored fabric. Cut the following colored fabrics:

	<b>Baby/Lap</b>	<b>Twin</b>	<b>Full</b>
Number of different fabrics	9 fabrics	35 fabrics	49 fabrics
For each colored fabric cut: <i>The number of squares varies with the block you are making. I cut these squares right before making the block to avoid wasting fabric.</i>		(2-4) 5” squares per fabric	(4-5) 2” squares per fabric

### **Make the Blocks:**

1. Sew the 9 Patch centers first.  
Sew 3 rows.  
Press to the colored fabric.





Sew rows together nesting seams.  
Press these rows in either direction.

2. Sew the rest of the block.  
Sew 2 or 3 rows depending on the block.  
Press to the colored fabric.

Sew the rows together nesting seams.  
Press these seams to the *CENTER* of the block.

# Number of Blocks to Make

Use a 1/4" seam throughout.

<b>Block A</b> 	5	12	17
<b>Block B</b> 		7	12
<b>Block C</b> 		6	8
<b>Block D</b> 	4	10	12

## 4. Non-Scrappy

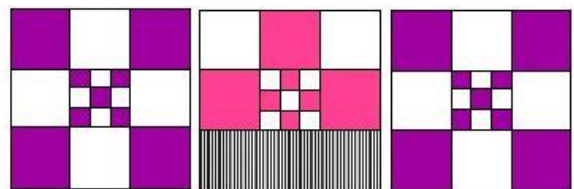
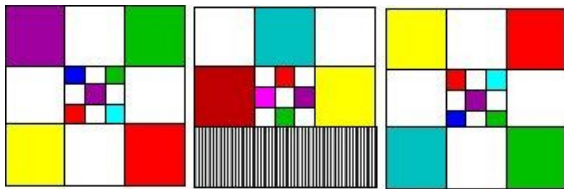
	Baby/Lap	Twin	Full/Queen
Dark Fabric – 2” Strips	(2) 2” strips Then cut (41) 2” squares	(5) 2” strips Then cut (90) 2” squares	(8) 2” strips Then cut (125) 2” squares
Dark Fabric – 5” Strips	(4) 5” strips Then cut (32) 5” squares	(8) 5” strips Then cut (60) 5” squares	(10) 5” strips Then cut (84) 5” squares
Medium Fabric - 2” Strips	(1) 2” strips Then cut (16) 2” squares	(4) 2” strips Then cut (68) 2” squares	(8) 2” strips Then cut (160) 2” squares
Medium Fabric - 5” Strips	(2) 5” strips Then cut (12) 5” squares	(8) 5” strips Then cut (58) 5” squares	(18) 5” strips Then cut (144) 5” squares

### Make Borders:

#### 1. Lap/Baby Quilt Top and Bottom Borders. Make (2)

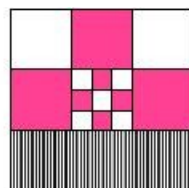
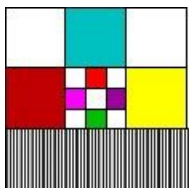
Sew a 5” by 14” striped rectangle to Block D.  
Press to the striped rectangle.

Sew a Block A to either end.  
Press to the striped border.



#### Lap/Baby Quilt Side Borders. Make (2)

Sew a 5” by 14” striped rectangle to Block D.  
Press to the striped rectangle.





## 2. Twin Top and Bottom Borders (Make 2)

-Sew 3 blocks together. Block D, Block C, Block D

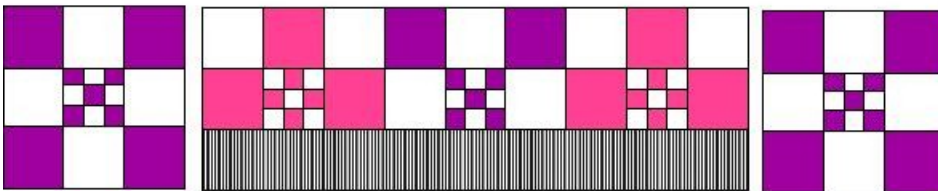
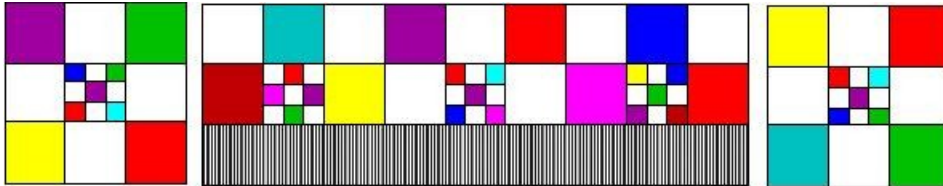
-Press in either direction.

-Sew a striped 5" by 41" rectangle to the blocks.

-Press to the striped rectangle.

-Sew a Block A to either end of each border.

-Press to the striped border.



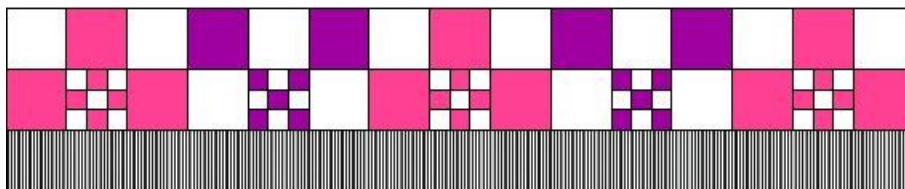
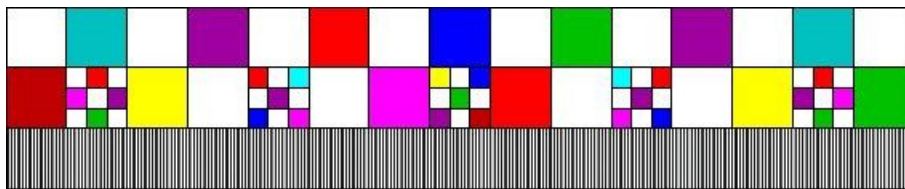
## Twin Side Borders (Make 2)

-Sew 5 blocks together. Block D, Block C, Block D, Block C, Block D

-Press in either direction.

-Sew a striped 5" by 68" rectangle to the blocks.

-Press to the striped rectangle.

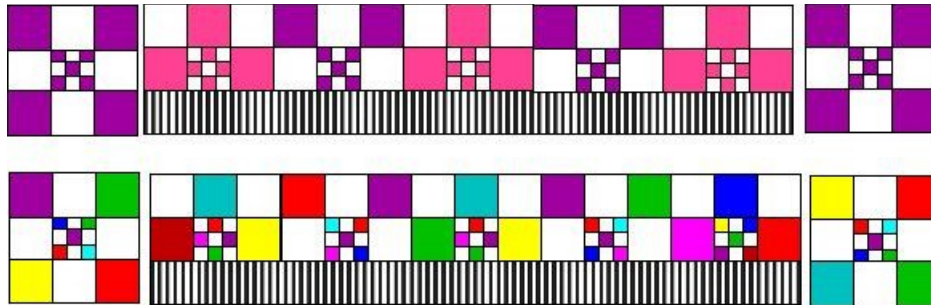


### 3. Full/Queen Top and Bottom Borders (Make 2).

-Sew 5 blocks together. Block D, Block C, Block D, Block C, Block D  
-Press in either direction.

-Sew a striped 5" by 68" rectangle to the blocks.  
-Press to the striped rectangle.

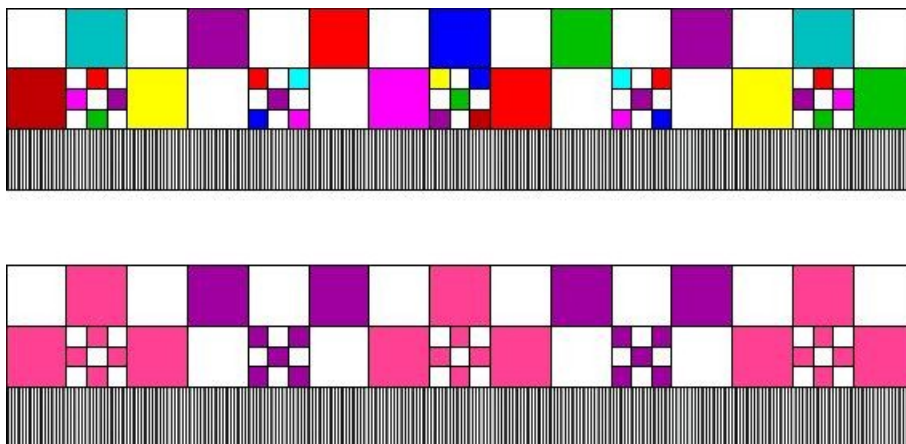
-Sew a Block A to either end of each border.  
-Press to the striped border.



### Full/Queen Side Borders (Make 2)

-Sew 5 blocks together. Block D, Block C, Block D, Block C, Block D  
-Press in either direction.

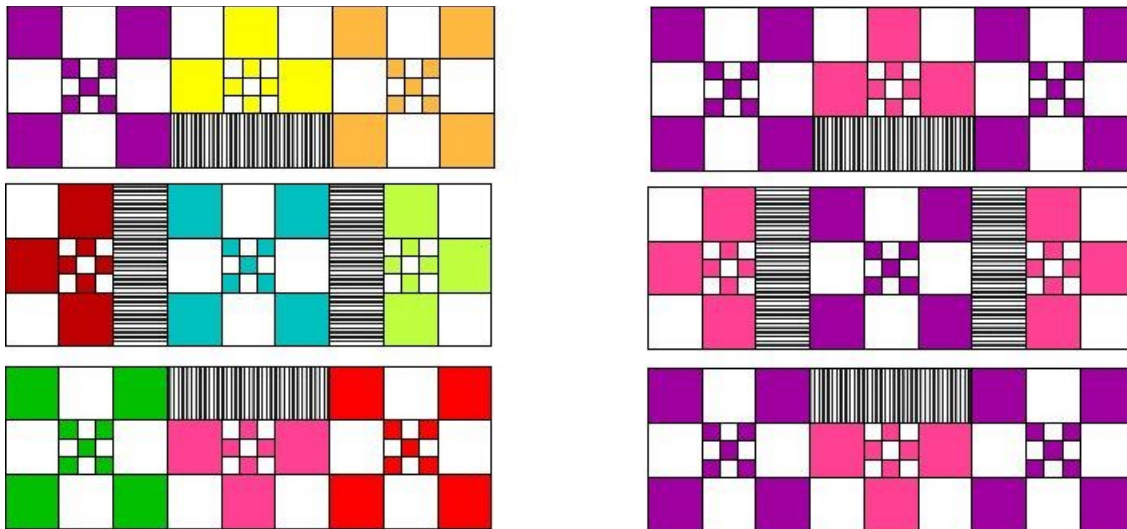
-Sew a striped 5" by 68" rectangle to the blocks.  
-Press to the striped rectangle.



## Final Assembly

### Lap/Baby Quilt

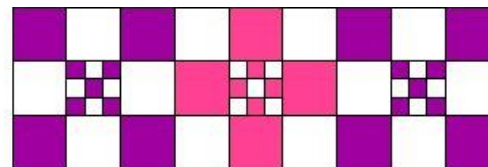
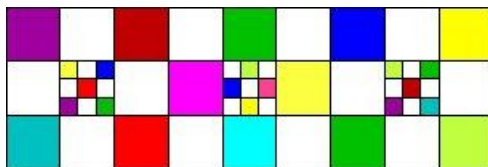
1. Sew a side border to either side of the remaining Block A.
2. Press to the side borders.
3. Sew on top and bottom borders.
4. Press to top and bottom borders.



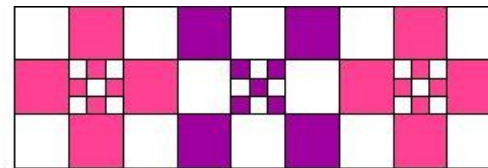
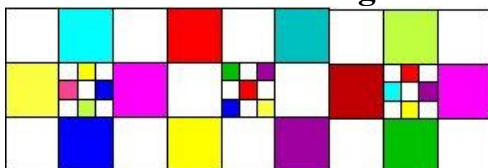
### Twin Quilt

Sew blocks into rows.

1. Sew (3) of Row A – Block A, Block B, Block A
2. Press to the left

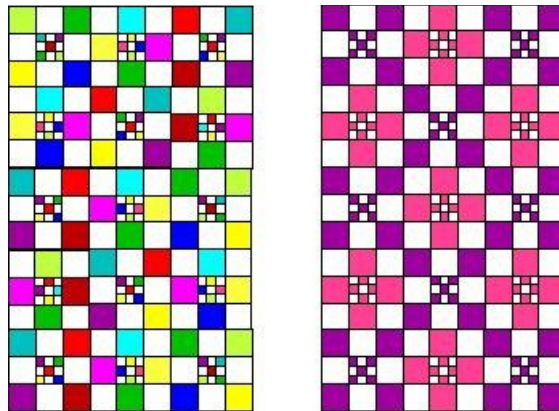


3. Sew (2) of Row B – Block B, Block A, Block B
4. Press to the right.



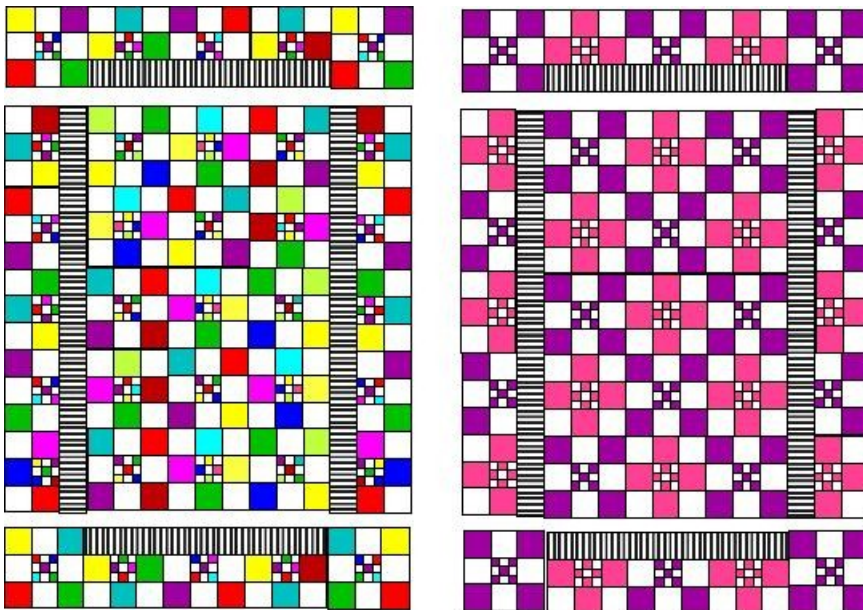
## Twin Quilt

Sew rows together, nesting seams. Row A, Row B, Row A, Row B, Row A  
Press seams down.



### Add the borders.

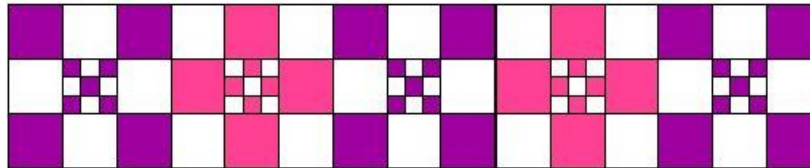
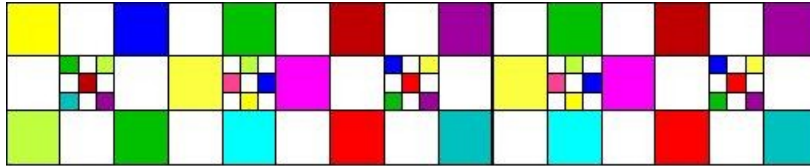
1. Sew a side border to either side of the quilt.
2. Press to the side borders.
3. Sew on top and bottom borders.
4. Press to top and bottom borders.



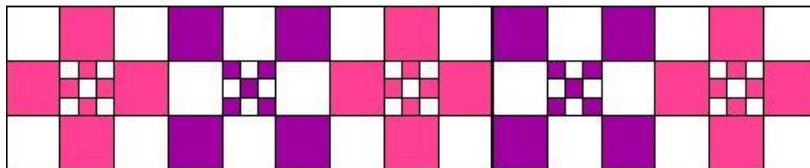
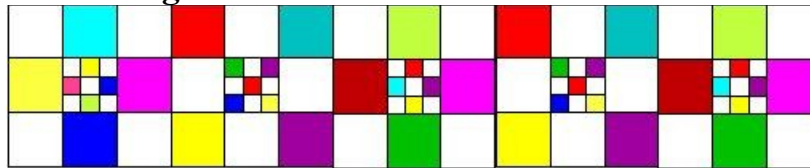
## Full/Queen Quilt

Sew blocks into rows.

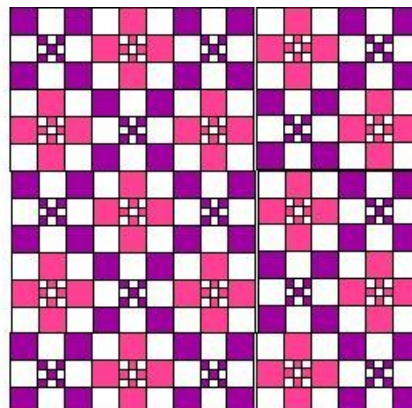
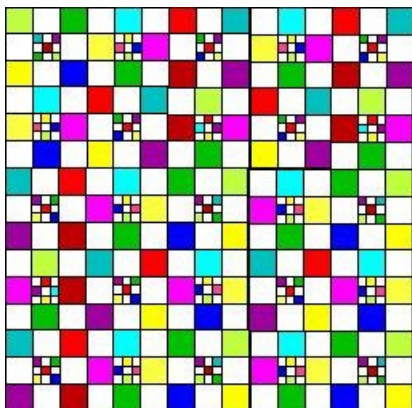
1. Sew (3) of Row A – Block A, Block B, Block A, Block B, Block A
2. Press to the left



3. Sew (2) of Row B – Block B, Block A, Block B, Block A, Block B
4. Press to the right.



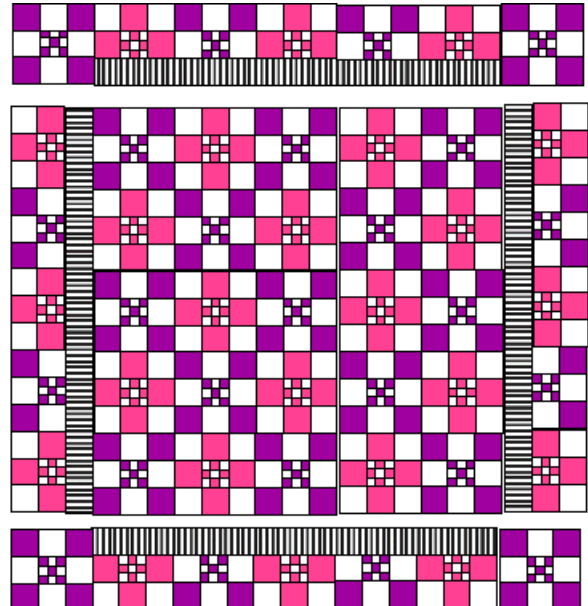
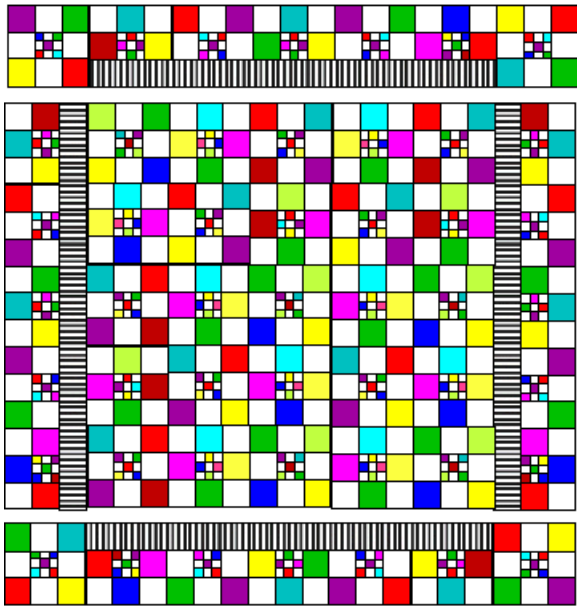
Sew rows together, nesting seams. Row A, Row B, Row A, Row B, Row A  
Press seams down.



## Full/Queen Quilt

Add the borders.

1. Sew a side border to either side of the quilt.
2. Press to the side borders.
3. Sew on top and bottom borders.
4. Press to top and bottom borders.
